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Snow Gear: Brrrr! It's once again beginning to feel like winter! Students will enjoy outdoor recess as much as possible (generally unless it's raining, or the temperature falls below twenty degrees). It's important for students to be wearing a winter coat, snow pants, hats, mittens/gloves, and boots when playing in the snow. Without this snow gear, students must stay on the blacktop portion of the recess area. Please let us know if your child needs any of these items for school. We can help!

Two Hour Delay: Please remember that school starts at 10:55 AM when there is a two-hour delay. Please do not drop off your children before 10:45 AM on two-hour delay days, as no staff members are on duty until this time. As we begin serving lunch shortly after school begins, there is no breakfast on two-hour delay days. Please ensure that your contact information is updated in Power School so that you receive the Alert Now calls that are issued when there are cancellations and delays.

Job Shadow: Idlehurst Elementary School will be celebrating National Groundhog Job Shadow Day on Thursday, February 2. Job shadowing is an activity that allows students to gain more knowledge of the World of Work, and job shadowing helps students to better understand the value of the lessons learned at Idlehurst Elementary School every day! All Idlehurst Elementary students who do not participate in National Groundhog Job Shadow Day are encouraged to Dress for Success on Thursday, February 2! Students participate in Dress for Success by coming to school with a career costume that is appropriate for school.

Career Spirit Week: Dates will be Jan 30- Feb 3rd. This is a week that we work with the Career Tech Education program at the high school to share with all the students the importance of career building and all the options that are in this world. Response to Intervention: The month of January has all students continuing to work in their intervention groups that are targeting their literacy needs. Kindergarteners are currently being benchmarked. Intervention groups will be formed based on their instructional reading levels. Also happening this month, students in grade 1 and 2 will be taking the Winter MAPS (NWEA) in both reading and math. By February, new groups of intervention will be formed using the NWEA data, instructional level updates, and in some cases benchmarking data.

Here are a few things to try this month when reading fiction books to your children:


Read with energy! Vary the tempo and volume of your voice to make the story interesting. Try using different voices for each character.
Talk with your child about the way each character is feeling. By using varied words to describe the emotions of the characters you are broadening your child's vocabulary. Try to use words other than mad, sad, and happy.

Tell your child what you enjoyed about the book and ask them to share what they liked (or didn't like) with you.

A FREE vision screening will be offered at school on Thursday January 26th. The screening will be provided by the Somersworth Lions Club. The nurse will be present at all times during the screening. The screening consists of an instant scan of the student's eyes to determine the possible presence of eye disorders. No physical contact is made with your child. The child simply looks at some blinking lights for a few seconds and a report will be sent home. The weather can be very cold at this time of the year. The children should be wearing **warm** clothing – coats, sweatshirts, hats, mittens/gloves. They do go outside for recess and special breaks during the school day. If there is snow, the students can play in the snow <u>only</u> if they have snow pants and boots.

Please let me know if you need anything for your child/ren to keep warm and to play in the snow.

Germs, germs, germs are everywhere – and they like to be shared when we are all together. **The best** way to prevent illness is HANDWASHING with soap and water or using hand sanitizer is the best way to reduce the spread of germs.

*****If you feel your child is ill, please have your child stay home and call to schedule a Provider appointment....Please do NOT send your child to school if sick before the appointment.** Please call the school in the morning if your child is ill during the night or in the morning – with any questions you may have. Your child needs to be <u>fever free</u> (without fever reducing Medication) for 24 hours before returning to school. If your child has vomited or has diarrhea, they should also stay home for 24 hours from the last time this occurred. ****Most important: Please send your student only if he/she is feeling well enough to participate in the learning environment when returning to school.**** Many students have returned not feeling well during the day and it is difficult for them to participate in the learning process. The **School Illness Protocol** has not changed since last year. Please call or email me at school with any questions or concerns.





Parents Make The Dífference

Teach your child to achieve any goal by following four steps

January is a time for taking stock and setting goals. Many adults make some type of New Year's resolutions. Then two weeks later, most realize that they haven't followed through. Kids are no different. This year, show your child how to achieve a goal. First, encourage your child to choose a goal that can be reached in a short time frame. Then, help your child follow four steps for achieving the goal:

1. State the goal. "My goal is to learn my multiplication facts." Ask your child to write it down and hang it in a prominent spot.

2. Plan how to meet the goal. "I will make flash cards and study them for 15 minutes every night. I will ask Dad to quiz me on Fridays."

3. Talk about the goal with others. This builds commitment to the goal. Your child should tell the teacher about the goal, too.

4. Do each step in the plan, one at a time. If problems come up, talk about possible solutions. Perhaps your child is too tired to review flash cards after a long day of school. It might work better to study them in the mornings while eating breakfast instead. Notice effort and progress each step of the way — and celebrate together when the hard work pays off!

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Share the wonders of science with your elementary schooler

You don't have to be a rocket scientist to teach your child about science. Just do some simple things like these:

• Encourage your child to collect and organize objects, such as leaves, rocks, shells or bottle caps.

• Encourage investigation. Give your child a magnifying glass. Ask, "What things do you see?" "What's similar and what's different with and without the glass?"

• Talk about the science that happens at home. Which cereals get soggy in milk? Why do foods in the refrigerator get moldy? Why do some plants need more water than others?

• Show an interest in science. Look at the moon and the stars with your child. Weigh snow. Mix paint colors.

• Include your child—as an observer or, better yet, a helper—when you make household repairs or work on the family car.

• Nurture curiosity. Ask your child questions. "Why do you think ... ?" "What might happen if ... ?" and "How can we find out ... ?"

• Go to the library. Check out books on different scientific topics.

• Give your child something to take apart—a ballpoint pen, a candle, an old toy. Encourage your child to figure out how it works.

• Talk about the weather. Have your child record the temperature each day for a month. Note whether the day was sunny, cloudy, rainy, or snowy. Which was the coldest day? How many snowy days were there?

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
