Title I Tips



for Reading Aloud to Your Child

Here are a few things to try this month when reading fiction books to your children:

- 1. Now that the weather is nicer, find a new and fun place to read to your child. Try sitting under a tree or reading at Willand Pond or along the Salmon Falls River.
- 2. Talk about the story as you read and relate it to your own personal experiences.
- 3. It's ok if you do not finish a book. If your child is losing interest, put the book away and finish it later. If you are feeling pressed for time, instead of rushing through to finish, find a good "hook" to stop as that keeps your child wondering what will be happen next. This will build excitement for the next time you read with your child.

Don't Let a Tick Make You Sick!

The weather is getting warmer & we can get outside! Protecting ourselves and our children safe from tick bites is important by following preventative measures https://www.cdc.gov/ticks/avoid/index.html):

*Wearing tick repellent

*Checking for ticks daily, especially after being outside

*Showering soon after being outdoors

If you do get a tick bite, to remove safely:

Use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin's surface as possible. Clean the bite area & your hands with rubbing alcohol, iodine scrub, or soap and water.

And we were able to fundraise so that the PTA is in a healthy spot to do even more next year.





REGIONAL CHESS TOURNAMENT




Calling all local chess players in grades 5-12

Parents Make The Difference

Treat reading as an enjoyable summer activity

To keep your child reading over the summer, treat it like any other fun summer activity. Demonstrate that reading can be an enjoyable activity that can be done in lots of different ways. Try not to make summer reading feel like an assignment. If you help your child make the connection between reading and the simple pleasures of childhood, the desire to read may last a lifetime.


To take a summer approach to reading:

- Suggest that your child reread a favorite book. Then find another book by the same author. Or find one on the same topic.
- Connect books with summer activities—sports books for a summer league player, for instance, or camping books for a camper.
- Let your child stay up past bedtime when a book is just too good to put down.
- Start your child on a series of mystery or thriller books. These page-turners hook kids into a reading habit.
- Encourage a change of venue. Read books at the beach or pool, in a tent or at the park.
- Watch movies, videos and plays based on children's books. Then read the books together and compare the versions.
- •Share your favorite books and magazines with your child. .
- Encourage your child to retell or act out stories from books.

RTI = Response to Intervention

How we meet the needs of each student



- RTI is a process of providing instruction in an organized manner using student data and known successful strategies.
- If students need further instruction and/or support beyond Tier 2 (Tier 3), this is provided to students in addition to the instruction and support being given in Tier's 1 and 2.
- The reason that we believe in RTI is that is helps us identify problem areas. This assists us in helping students long before they fail.
